

# Information for authors

# General guidelines

Articles should be around 6,000 to 10,000 words. Submissions of articles should include:

- the authors' names and affiliations (please mention professional involvement with relevant parties discussed in the paper, if applicable);
- contact details of the corresponding author (especially e-mail address);
- an abstract of no more than 200 words;
- three or four keywords.

Submissions should follow "standard" formatting rules: 1.5 line distance, Times New Roman 12 pt as font and font size and page margins of 2.5 cm.

## **Guidelines for citations**

Given the inter-disciplinary nature of the Competition and Regulation in Network Industries, we do not impose mandatory citations rules. We encourage you to use the citation formats below (download) the Endnote output style).

## Illustrations (tables, graphs and figures)

- Make sure you use uniform lettering and sizing of your illustrations;
- Only use the following fonts in your illustrations: Arial, Courier, Helvetica, Times, Symbol;
- Number the illustrations according to their sequence in the text;
- References should be made in the text to each illustration;
- Produce images near to the desired size of the printed version.
